

Last week, Premier Christy Clark was in town for the chamber luncheon and they were given the opportunity to ask only three direct questions. They used that opportunity to bring up the mussels.

"We think it is that critical," says Caroline Grover, chamber chief executive officer. "If you think of what

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is at the heart of our area, it is the clean water. We take pride in it, we drink it, we enjoy the recreational aspects. Water is critical for our farming and agricultural related industries. It is certainly a great draw when people want to move to our area; they love to look at the lake or live on the lake. And tourism is an important industry as well. I cannot imagine what our tourism would look like without having pristine lakes."

She says just one mussel could cause catastrophic damage to the tourism industry, real estate values and taxes, as municipalities would be forced to pay millions of dollar to clear the numerous water intake valves and the lake itself.

"This is of dire concern to us and we would like to know what actions we can expect from the province," says Grover. "We are putting out a call for inspection stations. At the end of the day, they are critical."

According to Grover, the premier acknowledged the issue at hand and said the province is looking into what needs to be done, but she did not commit to any funding.

"I think it was good she was aware of the issue. She seemed to be very mindful of the facts and knew exactly what we were talking about," explains Grover. "While she stopped short of saying they will fund boat check stations, she did indicate that there needs to be continued training and monitoring of our borders."

She says the chamber has put together a policy resolution on the issue that has received approval from all other chambers across the province and the country.

"We will be meeting with the BC Chamber of Commerce in Prince George in June and we have another resolution ready to go that is calling on the provincial government, specifically, to put a plan of action in place."

She knows that asking a government and tax payers to spend money is difficult, but it is critical spending that could prevent an infestation we would never recover from.

Findlater adds that mussels have made it to the province before and were fortunately either dead or detected by an alert border guards. Mussels were also discovered on several boats in the Calgary area - a major source of Okanagan tourists.

"They are getting through and our concern is that all of the lakes in B.C. could be infected, and in particular our Okanagan Lake that is so important to us. It is really the lifeline in the Okanagan Valley," says Findlater.

The board has suggested a user paid sticker program that would offset the costs of inspection. Boaters would buy a sticker to confirm they had been inspected and to raise awareness.

As it stands the province has estimated it would cost about \$2.4 million per year for 15 boat check stations, while the province also estimates an infestation would cost approximately \$28.2 million per year to fix.

But board studies suggest an introduction of the mussels could cost at least \$43 million a year in the Okanagan alone just to mitigate the problem.





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Just to clarify, as the Executive Director of the Okanagan Basin Water Board, the figure of \$28.2 million estimated by the province will not "fix" the mussel problem, but will be ongoing maintenance and management costs, primarily borne by local communities. Once the mussels are established in the lake, they cannot be eradicated. \$28.2 million also a very low estimate, as (among other things) it does not include impacts to private water intakes for lakeshore residents or agriculture, of which there are more than 900 on Okanagan Lake alone. Each of these intakes will have to be modified with special chlorine systems to prevent their being clogged by the mussels. This figure also does not include maintenance costs for Kelowna's floating bridge, which would likely have to be scraped and repainted each year, or the damage to docks and other in-lake infrastructure. The mussels will severely harm our sports fishery, and completely change the natural aquatic environment of the lakes. In areas of the Great Lakes where they have taken hold, we've heard many accounts of the beaches being covered by sharp shells, requiring all beach-goers to wear shoes or risk cutting their feet. Make no mistake - these mussels are bad news, and once they are here, there is no going back.

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
